### 1. Welcome, Approval of the Agenda, Approval of March minutes

## 2. Principal's Report - Martina Sherwood

Our school team has been working on the development of Progress Reports (grades 1-8)/Initial Communications of Learning (Kindergarten) over the past few weeks. This year they are being completed using a new software program so we have been on a bit of a learning curve. These reports will be sent to parents via School Messenger on November 17th. We will be offering interviews on the evening of November 24th and the morning of November 25th. There will be an option to attend virtually, in person or by phone. To do this we will be using an online interview booking application called Schoolinterviews.ca. Our goal continues to be to give parents an overview of how their child is progressing in parent-friendly language. The Progress Report is not a final assessment, it is a discussion of their progress at this point.

Last Friday our team engaged in a full day of learning. We had a session focused on Equity-Centred Trauma-Informed Education. We deepened our understanding of what trauma is, the impact of trauma and how to create the conditions for learning that support the well being and achievement for all. During this session we did a lot of self-reflection on our current practices. Dr. Tranter's The Third Path informed a lot of our learning as we looked at the protective factors for student learning and well-being. These included, engagement, identity, mastery, meaning, safety, regulation, belonging, and positivity.

We also reviewed our district's anti-sex human trafficking reporting and responding protocol. Connecting this learning to the health curriculum content through topics such as consent, boundaries and healthy relationships was also part of this learning.

Having time to further develop our proficiency in navigating the new software for completing Progress Reports/Report Cards rounded out our day of learning.

We continue to enjoy the normal vibes around the school with cautious optimism. The opportunity for our intermediate and junior students to participate in a dance and be social together was met with lots of excitement. Our classrooms are busy places full of learning and discovery. Our yards are non-stop action whether it be basketball, four square, soccer, football, tag or just roaming around with friends.

Thank you for the funding. We have allocated the funds shared and will be working with our divisional teams to prioritize items/experiences. This week we tapped into our "Say Yes" line to replenish our supply of calculators – thank you for this!

## 3. VP Report – Sandy Miller

**School clothing sales** complete. We had about 75 purchases, delivery will be late November. The Sam Group packages the items by homeroom and by customer making it easy and fast to distribute.

**Field trips** for our Kinders, Intermediates and juniors have taken place to the library and MacSkimming. Thanks to parent volunteers we have been able to offer meaningful activities at all levels.

**Website updates** I worked with Petra to review and update the School Council pages of our school website. It is still an ongoing work in progress.

**Indigenous Education Tea & Talk with Kareena Butler** On October 27 Kareena Butler, Indigenous Education Itinerant Teacher, joined us for the day to speak with our educators. She spent the day meeting with various teachers to share resources, ideas and support.

## a. Yard Committee: Fall clean-up - Katie

The fall Yard clean up was a success. It was wonderful to see some new faces in the yard, and especially Josee and Carlo who have expressed an interest in being more involved in the yard committee! Thank you to everyone who came out to help! We took part in the usual tasks of weeding (there is never enough time to get them all), picking up garbage, sweeping mulch back into beds and raking up leaves and debris. As much as possible we tried to rake leaves into the garden beds, against the fences or other areas where they can stay put for the winter, insulate the soil and provide free mulch and fertiliser in the spring. If it looks like there are still lots of leaves in some of the beds that's why! Every year we rake up bags of leaves to keep the paths clear but as much as possible if leaves can be strategically stored and salvaged within the garden beds it will be better for the soil health of the yard long term.

Josie also talked about the bed under the Kindergarten yard, wanting to try to establish some plants in that bed. Seed in some native grass wouldn't be very expensive - put grass seed down before it snows. Might need to fence off the area to stop the kids going on it for a year. Might be some concern how we could stop kids getting into that area. Martina will speak to Chris Farquhar to see what could be done. Possibly get kids to have ownership of the new plants. Previously plants had been bought but they got stomped on so the thought was that grass might be a better option. Meghan Storey had expressed interest in being involved in gardening with students.

A big thank you to all the volunteers for the excellent community event. All items were sold or donated on the day.

#### c. Pizza day/ Lunch program - Sarah Matthews & Aleks Brading
